Part 3 of 3

Operations Winding Down

By this time Major Smillie was stationed in Europe and Camp Santa Anita was beginning to close down much of its training operations. The desert training center at Llano was closed. Camp Sabba and Horse Flats were also secured. The only facility still open and training was the Street fighting course at Big John Flat. It was now under the "Military Branch" control. This unit assumed control of all remaining ordinance training areas and Camp Santa Anita.

All Ordinance men received a two week refresher course in basic military training prior to shipping out to other posts or overseas. May 6, 1944 saw all facilities secured except the "street fighting course" This facility was, "Available for use",

to a limited extent, by Post overhead personnel

Training continued, but for how long? To date we have no official record of its closing. As a young man working for the United States Forest Service, I know the facility was in operation during the summer of 1944. Periodic convoy's of three axle trucks loaded with troops and supplies would pass the Ranger Station at Valyermo on a regular basis. A forest Patrolman's binoculars gave me a long distance look at the German Village in late summer of 1944 It was in use at that time.

Where Are The Builders Today?

Major Smillie survived the European Theater of Operations during 21½ months of service. He was honorably discharged March 21, 1946 at Fort McArthur, CA. A civil engineer, Mr. Smillie became involved in the development of the Victor Valley area after the war.

Mrs. Smillie and son, Robert, currently reside in Apple Valley. Son, Bill Smillie recently retired from service to the County of San Bernardino, Special Districts. He managed a number of domestic water districts and several waste water districts from Los Angeles County line to Yucca Valley. Mr Smillie and his wife, Carol reside in Phelan.

Sgt. Walter Whitney was transferred to several posts and finally ended his service in Honolulu, Hawaii His interviewer detected some irony in his story. He had returned to the "German Village" for training in street fighting and expected to stay with Major Smiflie's group

when they left which did not happen.

Why???

When questioned why Army Ordinance constructed the "German Village" training facility, he chuckled and said, "that's a good question!" Then he noted that all of the' trades working on the project were older experienced tradesmen. Sgt. Whitney said "our company were journeymen before we entered the service." "Our group was put together by Major Smillie in Aberdeen, Maryland. He wanted experienced, older men." Sgt. Whitney returned to Middleton, Wisconsin after the war and remained there.

Smillie with its wonderful pictures. The German Village of ANNADORF is a true ghost town of another time.

Annadorf Revisited!


